

Annual Report and Accounts 2006-7

Introduction

During the financial year the main activity of the Trust was as in previous years the management and development of the London Canal Museum.

The Trust's objectives are to advance_public education regarding inland waterways through the operation of a museum. The trust operates in accordance with its constitution of 1979, as modified in 2001. Members of the Council of Management are elected annually from the membership of the Trust, which is open to everyone.

The Trust's policy with respect to reserves to be held is to maintain a minimum of £12,000 of reserves as a contingency reserve. In particular this is necessary in case of any need for unforeseen building maintenance expenditure. The Trust retains further sums as may be necessary for future development projects.

The year was one of considerable development and the achievement of several projects towards which we had been working for some time.

Special Events



During Museums and Galleries Month, May 2006, we held another successful "Ice Day" and took a number of people down into the well under carefully controlled conditions.

We again hosted two performances by the Mikron Theatre Company, who tour the country by boat. (illustrated)

At the end of October 2006_we took part in another joint operation with Camden Canals and Narrowboat Association. Large numbers of children enjoyed a boat trip through Islington Tunnel and various activities in the museum associated with Halloween. The museum's Bantam IV Tug had to be pressed

into last minute service to assist a failed narrowboat in order to ensure that everyone who had pre-booked was able to travel.

Education



The museum substantially completed the education development project funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund, leaving only a few minor components to be completed subsequently. Five packs of learning resources were produced by the Education Development Officer covering various themes.

The museum was delighted to be awarded the Sandford Award for education at a ceremony in Edinburgh attended by the museum's Education Development Officer.

Following the end of the 18 month fixed term of the Education Development Officer, the museum commissioned a funding advisory report from a consultant to review options for the future funding of an education post. The report pointed to a difficult situation. Whilst funding for new development is sometimes on offer from a variety of bodies, there are few organisations willing to support ongoing good work in the field of education in museums.

Nonetheless the Education Development project delivered substantial results, and equipped the museum with a good range of educational workshops and teacher-led activities as well as enhancing our provision for children visiting with their own families. During the employment of the Education Development Officer we were able to develop relationships with a number of other community bodies and organisations involved in waterways and education in London.

Financial Progress

During the course of the year the museum's bank loan was reduced to around £8,500 with a clear expectation that it would be completely repaid by Christmas 2007.

The income was over £118,000, a substantial increase on any previous year. Income from venue hire was £54843 and this enabled the museum to progress a range of projects.

The Trust also had significant income from mooring fees which is expected to increase in the future. Encouragingly income from admission fees was around £19,000, an increase on the previous year, and an indication of our increasing success in attracting visitors.

Marketing

The museum was proactive in promotion, with an increased level of advertising expenditure [spend] compared to previous years. We again took part in the highly successful "2 for I" promotions arranged by the train operating companies and a number of lesser promotions.

Modernisation of the museum's website was progressed during the year. The site now attracts in excess of 30,000 unique visitors per month.

Care of Collection



The museum's model of a Gatti horse and cart, which dates from the 1890s. was cleaned by a specialist conservator, and minor repairs made. We were grateful to ALM London for a small grant to support this conservation work. The model was removed from the Victorian case, which is of no special value in itself, and a new modern case with lighting and climate control was provided, at the Trust's own cost. This state-of-the art case now provides a much greater degree of physical protection for the model housed in it, makes the model more accessible to the visitor, and has dramatically improved the environmental conditions in which the model is kept. The old case has been retained but is not on display.

The foundation stone from another ice warehouse in Caledonian Road, acquired by the Trust in 2004, was treated by a specialist stone conservator and cleaned for display. It was fitted to the wall as part of a rearranged and enhanced ice trade exhibition on the ground floor. This stone had been laid by Carlo Gatti's wife_and daughter in 1872.

Improved monitoring for any potential pest infestation was introduced

A start was made on the digitisation of the photographic collection.



Improvements were made to the protection of the horse care artefacts display, with a transparent cover to prevent damage. A new set of interpretative sheets was designed to be accessible to wheelchair users and other visitors alike, sliding on a rail to be adjustable as the visitor moves along the exhibition.

The museum produced its first Preservation Plan setting out our intentions for future improvements in care of the collection.

Exhibition Development



The museum's long-running ambition to add a large map of London's waterways to its exhibitions was realised. More than two and a half meters long, the map is a detailed depiction of London's canals and other navigable waterways, together with lines of route of those that were never built, and information about the basins, canalside industry and other features. It is designed to be accessible to those without a detailed interest in the historical features as well as physically accessible: a separate low-level version of the map has been installed for wheelchair users so that they can also study the detail that would otherwise be too high on the wall.

An introductory exhibition panel sets the context of London in the wider canal network prior to viewing the map. The Trust believes that this map is a major enhancement to the museum. The project was partly

funded by the remaining balance of a basket of grants for first floor development. The donors included the Headley Trust, the Trust for London, The Goldsmiths Company and the Charles Hayward Foundation. A significant part of the cost was met from the Trust's own resources.

During the course of the year the Trust was delighted to learn of the existence of a recording, made some years previously, of the son of a former ice trade worker talking about his father's work in our building. With the kind permission of the family member who made the recording, this has been turned into an audio exhibit that vividly portrays the harsh conditions of work in the ice trade. A transcript for the hard-of-hearing is also provided.

Further enhancements have been made to the ice trade exhibition by the repositioning of certain artefacts, the addition of an additional panel and labels, and the manufacture of mock ice blocks to illustrate the way in which ice handling equipment was used.

New labels were also produced for the bucket fire extinguisher and the audio exhibit mentioned above.

A range of improvements were made to the museum's children's corner, now called the "Activity Zone". A new children's flip-book describes how to use the bridge building activity and some of the engineering



principles of the arch are simply explained. Improvements to the décor, carpeting, and railings have been made during the year and the Activity Zone is complemented by a Children's Trail around the museum that can be used by children visiting with their parents.

The museum's portable forge, part of the horse power exhibition, was fitted with an illuminated "glowing coal" effect and repairs were made to the hand-operated blower [impellor] so that it could be worked. A sensor was fitted so that as the wind pressure increased, the glowing of the coals appears brighter.

Access for Disabled Visitors

Work began on the planning of an audio tour for visually impaired visitors. The script was prepared and work began on the planning of the system which takes advantage of modern technology to deliver location-specific audio commentary to the visually impaired visitor as he or she walks around the building.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE CANAL MUSEUM TRUST FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2007

We report on the financial statements, which are set out on pages c to j.

Respective responsibilities of the Trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees consider than an audit is not required for the year (under section 43(2) of the Charities Act 1993 and that an independent examination is needed. NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2007

1. Accounting policies

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the SOFA on a receivable basis.

Turnover

Income represents amounts receivable.

Depreciation and diminution in value of assets

The Canal Museum Trust owns the freehold property in which the London Canal Museum is situated. In the absence of a professional valuation, the costs of obtaining which the trustees consider would outweigh the benefits to the Trust, the freehold property has not been capitalised in the financial statements.

In addition, the museums artifacts, exhibition materials and fittings are capitalised but written off to income and expenditure in the year of purchase.

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving stocks.

Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees for particular purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. the aim and use of each restricted fund as set out in the notes to the financial statements.
